### **Prepositions: An Introduction**

More Work with Prepositions Sometimes you might mistake another kind of phrase for a prepositional phrase For example, do not confuse a prepositional phrase with a subordinate clause Example: Before we go, take your coat from the closet Even though before can be used as a preposition, before we go is a subordinate clause

For prepositions, the sentence does not rely on the prepositional phrase to make sense A good way to test if something is a preposition is to move the prepositional phrase to the front of the sentence If it still makes sense, it is a preposition This doesn't work You need to choose just one preposition per prepositional phrase
